## A Message From Pastor

Each year on Ash Wednesday, we are encouraged to live a holy Lent, with repentance, prayer and fasting, almsgiving and deeds of love. We remember we need to repent and turn our hearts back to God, so that we may appreciate all of God's gifts to us, especially the gift of God's Son. We remember God gives us everything we have, including the food we eat, so we fast, to make ourselves more aware of the abundance we really have. We make a more serious attempt to remember that some people in our community do not have many of the things we take for granted.

Lent is a journey, 6 weeks of focusing on holy living.

It is long enough that we can pace ourselves. It is a marathon, not a sprint, so we can take the time to reflect on what it means to truly follow Jesus, as his 21<sup>st</sup> century disciples. It does end, with the cross, and then the resurrection. When we make the effort to live more holy lives, it does not make God love us more; but it may help us understand more fully how much God loves us.

## Midweek Worship

Lent midweek worship this year will have us focusing on the words and actions that lead to holy living at noon and pondering Jesus' last prayers in the evening.

At noon, during a spoken service, we will consider the "Shema," the prayer Jews pray each day, and which Jesus quoted when he was asked, "Which commandment is the greatest of all?" Jesus answered, "Hear, O Israel, you shall love the Lord you're your God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength." (Mark 12:28-30)

We will begin by considering the covenant promise between God and us: Hear, O Israel. Then each week following, we will reflect on what it means to love the Lord with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength. How can we love the Lord from the depths of our heart? How can we satisfy our soul when it thirsts for God? How can we use our minds to walk in faithfulness with God? How can God be our strength and our salvation when he himself was weak enough to die on the cross? Pastor Lynn will lead worship and Deacon John and Deacon-in-Training Diane will lead the

reflections.

At the evening worship services, we will sing a hymn version of the service of Evening Prayer. The mediation for the evening will be scenes from a drama entitled, *The Prayers of the Passion*. The six parts of the drama will cause us to consider the role of various people in Jesus' life in relationship to his prayers. In the first scene, "Let this cup pass," Judas and Salome, one of the women who followed Jesus, consider the need for Jesus' death. This part of the drama will be performed at both the noon and 7pm Ash Wednesday service.

In subsequent weeks, Leah and her mother are servants in the household of Caiaphas the high priest in the scene, "Why have you forsaken me?" In the scene "Father forgive them," Simon of Cyrene and his wife Miriam discuss why Simon was forced to carry Jesus' cross. Herod and Pilate write letters to each other discussing their handling of the situation of the criminal and traitor Jesus of Nazareth in the scene, "Jesus, remember me." In the scene "Into

### From 1990-1992 newsletters

Highlights of the show were: Betty Doelker gave a rendition of Sophie Tucker's "Some of these Days;" some ballerinas with Francine Richard and tutu helpers Walter Bruckert, Leo Sorensen, Don Geyer, and Mel Friant; some flappers with Jo Jennerich, Susie Clark, and Dorothy Scianna; Charlie Long with "Lydia the Tattooed Lady;" an apron- and duster-clad group of men demonstrated why "It's so nice to have a man around the house." The closing numbers included "You're a grand old flag" and "God bless America" with Helen Erb as Miss Liberty.

A recipe for cookies for those who don't like to make cookies:

1 package of 2-layer cake mix

$\frac{1}{4}$  cup softened butter or margarine

$\frac{1}{3}$  cup milk

1 egg

$\frac{1}{2}$  teaspoon vanilla or other flavoring

Combine all ingredients in a mixing bowl and beat until smooth. Drop from teaspoon on a greased cookie sheet.

Bake at 375 degrees for 12 minutes.

## Martyr Moments

On Thursday, February 23, one of the first Christian martyrs, Polycarp, was commemorated. Born about 60-65 Common Era (C.E.) he was befriended by Ignatius, a first century church writer from Smyrna. He became the Bishop (or pastor) of Smyrna and a writer regarding Christian worship. At the age of 91 or so in the year 156 C.E. Polycarp was accused of not paying homage to Caesar as divine and refused to recant Jesus Christ. The Roman police chief in charge of his arrest is Herod. The Roman governor did what was lawful and condemned Polycarp to death by burning at the stake.

Polycarp was tethered to a stake and a fire built around him. But something curious happened-the fire seemed to build a wall around him. There was no burning of his flesh with the terrible smell but rather his skin become brown and there was the aroma of spices. The Governor instructed a guard to kill Polycarp with a sword but as the sword was driven in, out from Polycarp came enough blood and water to put the fire out. It also has been written

that at the moment of Polycarp's death a dove left his body.

Although this story was written by "eye witnesses" scholars believe that there are some obvious fictional touches in the account. What Polycarp and Ignatius, who was also martyred, thought of the torment they willingly received, we will never really know. What we do know is that they never recanted Jesus even until death. There still are those in the world today who are persecuted for their belief in Jesus Christ. Please include in your prayers those that do not have freedom to worship Jesus openly.

## Brain Gain

At the Seniorfest conference February 13 the speaker, Mark Schoepp of Wheat Ridge Ministries, talked about the connection between the brain, exercise, nutrition, and rest/play time. In studies with teenagers, researchers have noted significant improvement in the ability to focus, control disruptive behavior, and manage anger when students have regular breaks for exercise, eat a healthy diet, and have ample time for recreation.

They have applied these learnings to caring for residents in nursing home and rehab centers and found that exercise, nutrition and rest/play time also improve the ability of seniors to function physically and focus mentally. Studies have shown that moderate exercise is enough; it doesn't take a marathon to show improvement in function and in mood.

Another factor in improving brain function is teaching the brain to work across the hemispheres, called cross-lateral training. Researchers have discovered the benefit of practicing cross-lateral exercises called brain breaks. Doing these

simple exercises aids in the ability to focus on the next task, for example listening to the sermon. (tee-hee!) Here is a brain break you can try.

Hold your hands out in front of your body. Clap them gently together a few times. Now hold backs of your hands together and clap them together gently. Without uncrossing your wrists, twist your hands and clasp them together. Bring the clasped hands inward toward your chest- you should look and feel rather like a pretzel. Now cross your feet one over the other. Breathe slowly for a minute or two, then return to resting position.
