Patrick. Bishop to Ireland 461

When he was about 16 years old he was captured from his home in Great Britain, and taken as a slave to Ireland where he lived for 6 years before escaping and returning to his family. After becoming a cleric he returned to northern and western Ireland. In later life, he served as ordained bishop, but little is known about the places where he worked. By the 7th Century he had already come to be revered as a patron saint of Ireland. His feast day is celebrated on March 17, the day of his death.

Did You Ever Wonder . . . ?

Did you ever wonder about the Church Calendar?

There are 3 main cycles in the church year: The Christmas Cycle, the Easter Cycle and The Time of the church. These cycles are divided into the more familiar sub-cycles.

The Christmas Cycle is divided into the Advent Season-colors on the altar are blue or purple. This is the time before Christmas Eve. The Christmas season color is white with a simple manger receiving elaboration through the additions of a crown, a symbol of authority and posed in order to underline the significance of the incarnation. The Epiphany Season underlines the star that led the Magi, thought to be kings, to the side of Jesus.

The Easter Cycle colors include purple, black and white for altar cloths. Because Jesus' death and resurrection constitutes God's most complete saving action for humankind, the lessons of Lent and Easter can be understood as a unit. We travel from the Ashes of Ash Wednesday to the stripping of the altar on Maundy Thursday to the black of Good Friday to the Pascal Candle and White of Easter.

The Time of the Church can also be called the Season After Pentecost. Red is the color of Pentecost that represents the Holy Spirit that descended, green is the color for most of the season concluding with Christ the King Sunday, which is white. This is a time for growth and faith within the church, through the power of the Spirit.

Jacob's Journey

Jacob's Journey is inviting everyone to study the wonderful letters and epistles of Paul which are the basis of our church theology today. A study of the book of Romans changed the life of Martin Luther and after that, changed the course of history with power of the Reformation. These books are certainly powerful and can greatly influence the course of a person's life as they feel the guidance of the Holy Spirit which

speaks to us through the Holy Word. Now is the time to draw closer to God and His Word.

My Story by Elizabeth Smart

On June 5, 2002 14 year old Elizabeth Smart, the daughter of a close-knit Mormon family, was taken from her home in Salt Lake City in the middle of the night by a religious fanatic, Brian Mitchell and his wife, Wanda Barzee. Elizabeth was kept chained, dressed in disguise, starved, experienced severe thirst with no water for a week, repeatedly raped daily and told she and her family would be killed if she tried to escape. After her rescue on March 12, 2003

she rejoined her family and worked to pick up the pieces of her life.

Critique: Diane Kahler This is a fascinating book about a religious nutcase and how Elizabeth's faith sustained her. Judgment of her actions must be tempered by the fact she was only 14 years old-still a little girl.
