Skin Remedy

Lately, my hands and arms bruised easily, and the slightest bump caused the skin to tear. The Quilting Group of Hope who donated 14 quilts made in January received a special thank you from the Citrus County Family Resource Center, who received that donation.

Since January of 2014 the Center has provided food for 11594 people in 5042 families. It also gave material aid such as blankets, clothes, and tents to 7868 people and provided 8793 service such as meals and

showers at Connections.

Did You Ever Wonder . . . ? Food Safety Alert

Did you ever wonder why the pastor washes her hand before Holy Communion?

Pastor washes her hands before doing the Lord's work of consecrating the elements but the history goes back into not only Jewish ritual but even before. Remember Pilot washing his hands at the time of the trial and later crucifixion.

The Jewish hand washing ritual may be a daily event. Upon arising the hands have water poured over them in preparation of the day with certain prayers asked that the hands do Adonai's work during the day.

May our hand keep the same ethic of doing our Lord's work during the day.

GREGORY THE GREAT-BISHOP OF ROME

C540-March 12,604

He's also known as St. Gregory the Dialogist for being a prolific writer. Throughout the Middle Ages he was known as "the Father of Christian Worship" because of his exceptional efforts in revising the Roman worship of his day. His contribution to the development of the *Divine Liturgy of the Presanctified Gifts*, still in use in the Byzantine Rite, was so significant that he is generally recognized as its de facto author. The Protestant reformer, John Calvin, admired Gregory and declared in his *Institutes* that Gregory was the last good pope. Gregory is the patron saint of musicians, singers, students, and teachers.

Dinner with a Perfect Stranger by David Gregory

What would you discuss over dinner with Jesus? That's the dilemma facing cynical but successful businessman Nick Cominsky when he accepts an invitation to join Jesus of Nazareth for dinner at a local restaurant. Nick is convinced that his friends at work are pulling a prank. But the man sitting across from him appears to be quite serious, introducing himself as "Jesus. My family called me Yeshua."

Nick accepts his dinner companion's suggestion to suspend his disbelief and "proceed as if I am Jesus". What follows is a fascinating conversation that covers family relationships, world religions, and the afterlife, among other topics. Along the way, Nick confronts his own unfulfilled longings, spiritual uncertainties, and anger with God-and he begins to wonder if the man across from him holds the answers to his deepest questions.



Over the past three months, four members of Hope Lutheran have met each Thursday evening as they undertake training to become Stephen Ministers. Stephen Ministers meet weekly with someone who is experiencing a life crisis or challenge, such as the death of a loved one, divorce, hospitalization, the loss of a job, loneliness, or relocation.

The workshop teaches how to care in a distinctively Christian way. The participants learn what makes Christian care-giving unique and how they can use resources like prayer, blessings, and scripture in their caring for others.

Participants John Chiappetta, Casey Gaylaro, Steve Northsea, and Kim Williams are all learning practical ministry skills and gaining an excellent understanding of how to serve members of Hope congregation with a caring ministry through the Stephen Series.

The four all will be commissioned Stephen Ministers at the end of the workshop which should be sometime in May. They will join current Stephen Ministers Ruth Moheit and Yvonne Popke to expand the ministry here at Hope.
