A Message from Pastor

On a Facebook page recently, there was this question: if you could change the name of our denomination from Evangelical Lutheran Church in America to something else, what would you name it?

There were many comments, many of them suggesting we drop “Evangelical” from the name, since it’s confusing to many people. Others suggested we drop “Lutheran” from the name, because a lot of people don’t know what Lutheran means. One person in jest suggested FRED – no, it doesn’t stand for anything, just FRED.

Which leads me to ask a question: if we could change the name of Hope Evangelical Lutheran Church, to what might we change it?

Does our congregation really offer hope to our members and regular visitors? Do we reach out with HOPE to those who feel hopeless? Is there another word that better describes who we are, and what we intend to offer?

Evangelical means sharing the good news of Jesus. Think about “angel” which is in the middle of the word evangelical. Are we God’s messengers, ready and sent by God to bring a message of Hope to God’s children? Would it matter if we took the Evangelical out of our name? (Even as I say that, I remember that I usually call this Hope Lutheran Church.) Do we really intend to share the good news of Jesus with our neighbors?

Personal Money Autobiography

At the March Congregational Council meeting, we discussed the concern that income is not matching expenses. We have worked consistently to pare expenses and continue to look for ways to spend the funds we have in a wise manner.

A Stewardship resource from the ELCA is titled *Rediscover Macedonia: A spirit of gratitude and generosity*. Based on Paul's letter praising the commitment and sacrifice of the people of Macedonia, he invited the people of Corinth to follow their example. "Brothers and sisters, we want to let you know about the grace of God that was given to the churches of Macedonia. While they were being tested by many problems, their extra

amount of happiness and their extreme poverty resulted in a surplus of rich generosity."

The council decided to invite members to use this resource, especially the *Personal Money Autobiography* questions. There are 16 questions, and each week, one of the questions will be in the bulletin. The four questions for the month will be in the newsletter. We hope that at the end of four months, all members will have used the questions to consider how and why they give what they give to the ministry of Hope.

At the end of the four months, we will gather as a congregation to share our personal discoveries, probably with a pot luck meal.

Writing a Personal Money Autobiography (ELCA Rediscover Macedonia)

Writing a personal money autobiography is an important step in expressing one's stewardship journey. The process reveals one's attitudes, behaviors and feelings about money. How does one go about writing a money autobiography? In this activity it is important to focus on different points in your life (childhood, adolescence, young adult, mature adult, etc.) Take a sheet or two of blank paper and write out your responses to the questions below. Reflect on these experiences and how specific understandings developed. After reflection you may want to write this into a chronological or topical sequence. Always be aware that money is only one aspect of being a steward.

May's four questions to add to your personal autobiography:

5. What role did money play in your life as a young adult? How was this influenced by a spouse or co-workers?
6. If applicable, how did your relationship with money change when you became a parent?
7. What is your happiest memory in connection with money?
8. What is your unhappiest memory in connection with money?

Martyr Moments Saint Monica

Martyr Moments

Saint Monica

Born Algeria 331AD-Died in Rome
387AD

Monica was an early Christian saint and mother of St. Augustine of Hippo. She is remembered and renowned for her outstanding Christian virtue particularly the suffering against the adultery of her husband, Patritius, and a prayerful life dedicated to the reformation of her son, Augustine, who wrote extensively of her pious acts and life.

Patritius was a pagan with an official position in present day Souk Ahras, Algeria. He was a man with a violent temper. Monica's sweetness, her alms deeds and her habits of prayer annoyed him. Monica bore 3 children-Augustine, Navigius and daughter, Perpetua. She was unable to have them baptized until Augustine fell very ill and Patritius gave

his permission. After Augustine recovered he rescinded his permission.

Augustine was a lazy wayward young man. But for 17 years Monica persuaded him to become a Christian. Augustine did become a Christian as did his father. Augustine wrote of his mother in Confessions 6.2.2:

“In place of a basket filled with fruits of the earth, she had learned to bring to the oratories of the martyrs a heart full of purer petitions, and to give all that she could to the poor-so that the communion of the Lord's body might be rightly celebrated in those places, where, after the example of His passion, the martyrs had been sacrificed and crowned.”

The city of Santa Monica, California is named for Monica.

Did You Ever Wonder....?

Did you ever wonder why we use lilies at Easter? Jesus singled out the lily as a sign of faith in God's grace. White lilies used in conjunction with the Virgin Mary or other saints indicate meekness and purity, an accent derived from the Song of Solomon. The fleur-de-lis is a variety of lily and is meant to suggest royalty.

LSF Expands Head Start

Head Start is a program designed to help children in economically depressed situations gain the skills needed to begin school at the same level as their peers.

Head Start is not a free baby-sitting service. Parents can enroll their children in Head Start only if they are gainfully employed or a full-time student. This is the type of ministry at which Lutheran Services Florida excels: a ministry that offers people in need a path to self-sufficiency rather than simply a handout.

LSF has successfully operated the PEPPI (Preschool Education Program with Parental Involvement) Head Start Program in Belle Glade for more than

30 years. This Gold Seal program has enabled LSF to bring healing, hope and help to the children of this impoverished area, and that program set the stage for a major expansion of Head Start services in other areas of the state.

Last year, LSF was awarded the contract to begin operating Head Start in Pinellas County, and just last month LSF was awarded a contract to operate the Head Start centers in Duval County. There is more expansion on the horizon.
